Program Notes

Where Is the Child?

John Ness Beck

"Where Is the Child" was composed by John Ness Beck. This piece invites us to rediscover the child within us and recapture the wonder of angels singing around the humble stable. As we grow older, it can become challenging to maintain the faith and wonder we had as children. Our students are blessed to be in an environment where they can grow in their faith daily. However, as they grow older and leave this nurturing environment, it may become harder to hold onto that childlike faith. Beck's composition reminds us of the importance of clinging to the foundation instilled in us as children and reflects on the greatest gift we received on that first Christmas night.

Come Follow that Star Don Besig

"Come Follow That Star" was composed by Don Besig. This piece anticipates the events of Epiphany, celebrated 12 days after Christmas, when the three wise men visit the baby Jesus. With its lively and energetic character, paired with a minor key that lends it a darker tone, this composition invites us on a journey. Join us as we follow the star to Bethlehem, where Christ the Savior has been born.

Still Still Still Mark Shepperd

"Still, Still, Still" is a well-known and beloved Austrian carol. Mark Shepperd has adapted this traditional piece into a tender and beautiful choral arrangement with woodwind and piano accompaniment. This breathtaking setting offers a glimpse of what it might have been like to witness the baby Jesus lying in the manger.

Carol of the Bells Steve Kupferschmid

The melody of "Carol of the Bells" originates from the Ukrainian folk song "Shchedryk", composed in 1914 by Mykola Leontovych. The title "Shchedryk" derives from the Ukrainian word shchedryk, meaning "bountiful." Over the years, this tune has been rearranged by many composers, transforming it into a beloved Christmas song.

Tonight's arrangement of "Carol of the Bells" was composed by Steve Kupferschmid.

Mary, Did You Know

Roger Emerson

"Mary, Did You Know" is a well-known modern Christmas classic. The lyrics were originally written as a poem by Mark Lowry for a Christmas play at his church in 1984. In 1991, the poem was set to music by Buddy Greene. Over the years, this piece has been arranged in various styles, bringing joy to countless listeners. Tonight's arrangement of "Mary, Did You Know" was composed by Roger Emerson and inspired by the Pentatonix version.

Come to the Manger

Vicki Tucker and Mark Austin

"Come to the Manger" was composed by Vicki Tucker and Mark Austin. This beautiful Christmas piece is crafted as a prayer, moving from gentle whispers of the nativity to a confident proclamation of the Savior's birth. Tucker and Austin remind us that, no matter what we may be experiencing during this Christmas season, we can always return to what matters most: our Savior, who was born in a manger.

Christmas Festival Leroy Anderson

"A Christmas Festival" was composed in 1950 as a concert overture built upon traditional Christmas songs. Originally recorded by the Boston Pops, it has become the standard for all Christmas medleys. Anderson masterfully captures the joy, celebration, and solemnity of the season in his arrangements of "Joy to the World," "Deck the Halls," "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen," "Good King Wenceslas," "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," "The First Noel," "Silent Night," "Jingle Bells," and "O Come, All Ye Faithful." While the Christmas season is often filled with excitement for presents and festivities, this piece reminds us of the true reason to rejoice.

Away In A Manger Robert Longfield

This sensitive and reflective arrangement of the beloved carol is enriched with contemporary harmonies and seasonal joy. It transitions from a soft, delicately scored opening to a powerful full-band section before returning to a quiet, serene conclusion. Through this piece, we are reminded that Christ was born in a lowly manger and humbly became man to save us from our sins.

In The Bleak Midwinter Robert W. Smith

This melancholy arrangement was created in memory of a beloved Virginia band director, Ms. Alta Sue Hawkins. Gustav Holst's beautiful melody serves as the foundation for Robert W. Smith's remarkable work. Beginning with a haunting single voice, the piece builds to a stunning climax before giving way to a simple restatement. Throughout the sorrowful melody, we are reminded that even when life feels bleak and filled with despair, we have hope in the Christ Child.

And All the Bells on Earth Shall Ring

All the Bells on Earth Shall Ring brings together four well-known bell carols, each richly scored with joyful bell motifs throughout. In order of appearance: "I Saw Three Ships," "Ding! Dong! Merrily on High," "I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day," and the "Ukrainian Bell Carol." Like all the joyous bells, we too should be filled with resounding praise as we celebrate the birth of our King.

A Jazzy Christmas Johnnie Vinson

Traditional carols are not typically associated with a swing style, but this creative arrangement presents some holiday favorites in a jazzy form. Johnnie Vinson includes "We Wish You a Merry Christmas," "The Holly and the Ivy," and "Good King Wenceslas" in this lighthearted and fun arrangement, bringing the joy of Christmas to all who hear it.
